## Convocation 2017

Excerpted from a talk delivered on August 29, 2017 by Sheila Bennett, English Department faculty and International Program houseparent.

It is always wonderful to see returning students full of smiles welcoming our new students from all over Maine and the world. To hear the hallways full of chatter and laughter lifts the spirits and sets a hopeful tone for the year.

It is that crackling sound of eager conversation that gives me hope at a time when our world is hurting. People all around us seem to be throwing up their hands in frustration and forgetting to turn to the art that you so well know: the art of growth through meaningful conversation. Not only when we agree, but especially when we disagree.

If I were to believe the blogs and the comment sections and the articles from all sides of the political spectrum, then I, too, would throw up my hands and walk away from the conversation. But I know better because I have seen better.

If I were to believe that we can't engage and connect with people because they are different from us (gender, race, politics, age, religion, ability), then I would halt my opportunity to grow. Full stop.

The poet Taylor Mali asserts, "Changing your mind is one of the best ways of finding out whether or not you still have one," which is an open invitation to grow based on newly understood evidence. Whether you accept or refuse the invitation is up to you. One of the most valuable lessons I've learned in the classroom since I began teaching in 1999 is that making assumptions is truly dangerous.

Without talking to each other, and more importantly, listening to each other, we cannot claim to know or understand someone's story.

To illustrate this point, I invite you to

take a moment to think about the teachers you've met and experienced here at John Bapst as they welcomed you as a new student, taught you, coached you, directed you. You know us, right? You may have made assumptions about your teachers based on what you know, but sometimes we need a reminder that people may be more than they appear.

Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan reminded us that "Everyone is entitled to [their] own opinion, but not to [their] own facts." Therefore, it's up to us to work together for a healthy culture of informed acceptance unburdened by assumptions, labels, and stereotypes.

That hallway chatter that quickens the pulse at this time of year sends a message that in the walls of John Bapst, all are welcome at the table. It is so important, now more than ever, to keep that conversation going. Allow people to make mistakes. Allow yourself to make them. Because we will.

We will try not to, but we will stumble. We're human. In all our silly, flawed, wonderful, ridiculous glory. And after that moment of weakness, armed with a new understanding of the person and not just assumed labels, we will lift each other up and do better. Each of you is worth knowing and has a fascinating story to tell. I am honored to be in the front row as you do so.

And with that, I wish you all success in the coming school year. Thank you.

## Kay Davis '62 • *The Gift of Service in Guatemala*

*When John Bapst alumna Kay Davis '62 received an e-vite to the annual school reunion at the Sea Dog Brewing Company, she replied that unfortunately she could not attend because she is in Guatemala serving two years in the Peace Corps. Here's her story.*

In February 2016, I was two years a widow, loving my kids and grandchildren, working full-time, and bored. So I called Peace Corps to see if I was too old to serve. It turns out they like older volunteers, even those with a few scratches and dents, like two hip replacements.

On February 2017, I was on my way to Guatemala and nine weeks of training. Now it is September and I am turning 72, living for the past four months in a little community, primarily indigenous (Mayan) in the Department of Chimaltenango. I will be here two years, concentrating on improving health outcomes for mothers and children. At the moment it means addressing chronic malnutrition which stunts growth and brain development, and helping improve

the skills of midwives who deliver about 85% of the babies.

Chimal is fourth in the country for childhood malnutrition. There are plenty of fruits, vegetables, chicken and eggs, but the local people sell them at market and live on tortillas, beans, and junk food from the corner store. Pepsi and Tortrix (corn chips), anyone? They do not understand nutrition, only not being hungry.

The midwives have generations of Mayan wisdom on herbs, massage, and how to manage a pregnancy, but often do not know the danger signs of serious complications that mean a woman may need to get to a hospital which may be a couple of hours' rough travel away. Or the importance of iron and folic acid that prevent harelip, cleft palate, and spina bifida.

I am struggling to learn Kaqchikel, the local Mayan language.

The vegetable lady erupts in laughter as I buy tomatoes, corn, onions, and bananas from her, but she helps me because I "show respect" by making the effort. I can now invite a mother into the clinic, tell her to sit down, ask her what hurts, and that I will get the doctor or nurse, all in Kaqchikel. I am an expert at deworming in the local schools. I visited a Franciscan-run children's home here and a little boy ran up and said, "She got rid of my worms at school!"

I get lonely. I long to speak English. I miss peanut butter, water I can drink without boiling for 5 minutes, and fruits and vegetables that I don't have to soak in bleach solution to kill the critters. I am still afraid of heights and everything here is up or down. I love every day and hope my health allows me to complete the two years. It feels like such a gift to be able to serve, even if my biggest contribution is a little boy with no worms.



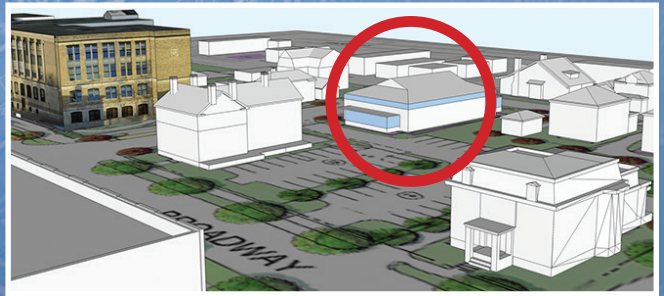
# GIVING SPIRIT

## A BIT OF HISTORY

led by Principal Joe Sekera, John Bapst undertook its last comprehensive capital campaign, called Proudly Forward, in 1990. That successful effort yielded classroom, lab, office, and other renovations. With the same kind of commitment and hard work, we now can achieve new goals and make long-awaited and necessary improvements a reality.

In 2013, the Board of Trustees adopted a strategic plan. We listened to parents, students, faculty, alumni, and friends, identifying the elements that have contributed to past success and asking how we could best go forward.

In early 2016, Gary Friedmann & Associates of Bar Harbor, Maine, conducted a feasibility study to determine the potential for a \$7.5 million campaign. Their study confirmed our belief that John Bapst has a unique and powerful relationship with its students, parents, alumni, and faculty. In June 2016, the Board of Trustees voted to launch a \$7.5 million capital campaign.

The school commissioned Bangor architects Ames Associates, in collaboration with Massachusetts-based school specialists Johnson-Roberts, to create attractive designs for the expanded campus that meet our specific needs.

### JOHN BAPST NEEDS FACILITIES THAT:

- give teachers exactly what they need to teach physical education, wellness, and fitness
- give coaches what they need to hold as many practices as possible on campus
- bring dining, events, and cooking functions together in new, dedicated spaces
- provide the fast-growing Technology Department with a state-of-the-art home for engineering, computer programming, cyber-defense, and robotics
- are eye-catching, helping to bolster strong enrollment
- fit the historic character of 100 Broadway and the Broadway Historic District

### WE HAVE COMMITTED TO THREE KEY AREAS:

- Teaching and Learning – investing in academic quality
- Community – creating attractive, functional spaces for athletes, fitness, dining, and events
- Sustainability – growing the endowment to ensure the school's financial future

## RE-FOUNDING FATHERS

In 1980, those closely connected with John Bapst High School faced an important decision. The school had just been closed by the Church, and the challenge faced was whether a private school could reopen in its place in time for fall classes. Four men got to work. **John F. MacKay, Earle Hannigan, Joseph Sekera '62**, and the late **William Lindsay**, with the support of countless others, were able to reopen the school as John Bapst *Memorial* High School in September 1980.

Earle Hannigan recently observed, "John Bapst was important in 1980 for Bangor and the community, and it still is today." John MacKay echoed this message: "We had a dream the school would survive; it is now very much alive." Looking ahead to the school's next generation of students, Joe Sekera added, "Something's going to happen here. Now is the time to address the shortcomings of our current athletic facilities and expand our vision of technology being a key to our students' future successes."



## NEW GYM AND FITNESS CENTER

One of the hallmarks of a John Bapst student has always been well-roundedness – academically, creatively, socially, and physically. Today, fitness and health are more important than ever.

John Bapst's current gym, built in 1928 with a small weight room added later, no longer meets the needs of students striving to make physical activity a lifelong healthy habit. An exciting new facility will meet this need.

- All physical education classes will relocate to the new practice gym and fitness center. A wide range of activities – basketball, badminton, ping-pong, cheering, weightlifting, aerobic training, and more – will be able to happen simultaneously on the gym floor and in the fitness center, allowing teachers to tailor instruction to individual student needs.
- In the mornings and afternoons, many more students will be able to access the facilities for personal training, recreation, team practices, and intramurals.
- Girls' and boys' freshman and JV basketball teams will be able to practice on campus at the same time.

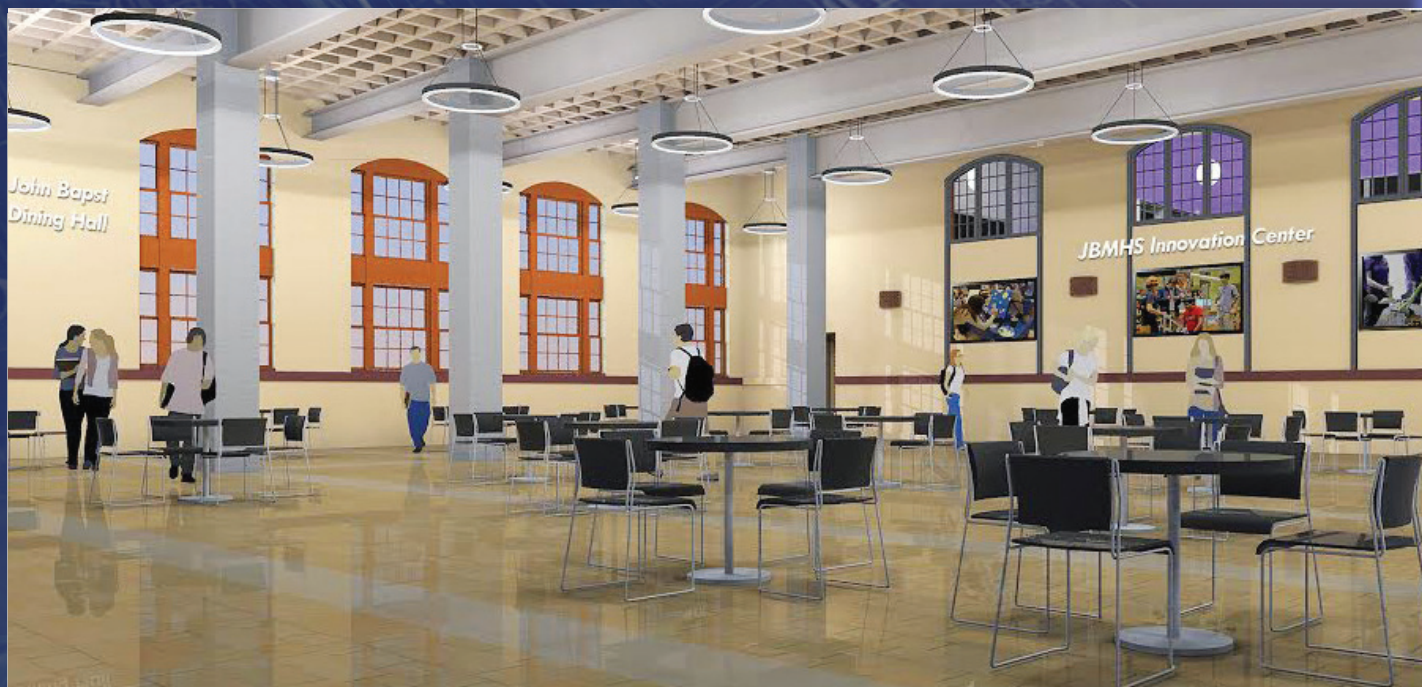


### EMILY AND ELISE TILTON NO SUCH THING AS AVERAGE

# DINING HALL, COMMUNITY CENTER, AND KITCHEN

**A** strong sense of community is integral to the John Bapst experience. One of the primary goals of the strategic plan is to increase opportunities for students, staff, parents, and alumni to gather and facilitate an even greater sense of belonging and school spirit.

The recently renovated Sekera Auditorium now serves as lunchroom, theater, concert hall, team dinner venue, craft fair site, art gallery, study hall, and morning and afternoon hangout for students. The new practice gymnasium and fitness center will allow the school to convert the current undersized gym into an ideally sized new dining hall and community center. With our architects' compelling design, we envision:

- a plan that restores the beautiful arched windows and

structural columns and replaces the floor, resulting in a classic New England school dining hall

- a dedicated space where breakfast, lunch, and dinner can be served, bringing day and boarding students together
- a professional kitchen where food can be delivered, cooked, and stored – including foods familiar to our international students who need a taste of home here at John Bapst
- a community facility for team dinners, Parents' Association coffees, student film nights, Lunar New Year celebrations, robotics tournaments, and a host of other events that now compete for space in the auditorium

Most of all, we want students to own this new space. After all, everything we do at John Bapst is done with students in mind.

# TECHNOLOGY AND INNOVATION CENTER

To succeed in a changing world, John Bapst students must have technology and problem-solving skills. This is the world we live in, where employees may be expected to know how to add content to a website, market products online, and lay out a newsletter.

Since 2009, technology has taken off at John Bapst. Students take Engineering I and II and AP Computer Programming. Afternoons and weekends are busy with the Cyber-Defense and Robotics teams. A student-led Tech Team provides support for faculty, staff, and students.

A purpose-built facility in place of the current locker rooms (to be moved to the new gym) is essential to meeting the needs of faculty and students, giving them:

- dedicated space for engineering and robotics, where now all functions are combined in a single classroom
- flexible space for hands-on, project-based learning and for large or small teacher-led instruction
- expansive windows overlooking the new dining hall and a new corridor system connecting music, art, and technology, making the entire building ADA-accessible.

# ENDOWMENT

The final goal of *Love that School: The Campaign for John Bapst* is sustainability.

Like all nonprofits built for the long run, we must have a solid foundation of funding available to ensure the future. Thanks to the visionaries who re-established John Bapst in 1980, to the community leaders they worked with to establish the John Bapst Foundation soon thereafter, and to many other generous

donors and advisors, John Bapst has an endowment valued at \$1.3 million. From this the school draws funds annually to support scholarships to deserving students.

Both to support the upkeep of a larger campus and to continue to support the school's core mission – to provide top-quality high school education to students of Greater Bangor and beyond – the school must continue to build this endowment.

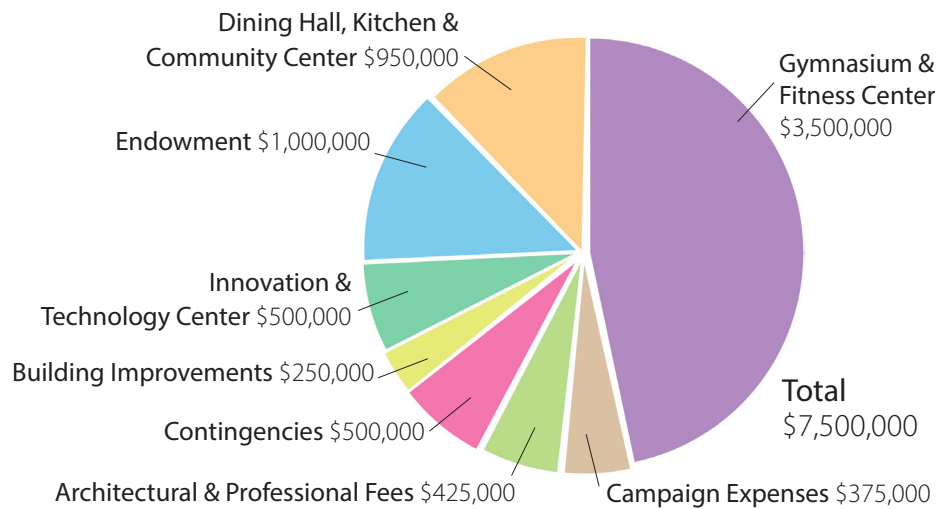

# DISCOVERING SELF AND SEA

Science teacher Dr. Tanya Lubansky and ten of her Field Biology students set sail for an epic adventure last August when they spent ten days on Mount Desert Rock. Owned by College of the Atlantic for field study, MDR is known for its rocky and treeless landscape as well as being a hotspot for biological productivity. Most observed are humpback, finback, and northern right whales as well as harbor porpoises and white-sided dolphins. Large populations of harbor and gray seals reside on the island, and seabirds gather there. College of the Atlantic maintains the area, while Allied Whale, the marine mammal laboratory at COA, has created a five-year study of marine mammal populations, using MDR as a base.

With her COA background, Dr. Lubansky was elated to introduce her students to the area and kick-start not only their research projects, but a compelling and hands-on class. Field Biology is a course that explores different marine-related topics while developing skills in research and data gathering.

While first a bit nervous about the trip, the nerves seemed to dissipate as soon as the students reached the island and were greeted by hoards of seals, sunbathing on rocks and bobbing in the water.

Student Emily Patrock wrote:  
*“Some places in this world are unmistakably beautiful to every eye that beholds it. Some places become beautiful from having beloved experiences*

*there. But there are some places, like Mount Desert Rock ... that are absolutely magical...*

*“On this island we would not only learn about how to conduct research and about the wildlife, but about ourselves as well. The island cast its spell on us ...*

*“On this island, we woke up near dawn to search for periwinkles. We watched minke whales surface from the historical lighthouse, waved in the salty air at the whale-watching boats, had cold-night campfires with s’mores, and watched the sunsets. We helped cook and do dishes. We ran across the rocks, and on the second-to-last day all jumped into the ocean together. It was the experience of a lifetime, and I still in the mornings close my eyes and try to pretend that I’m still there – even for just a few seconds.”*

Over a week later, parents gathered around the pier, chatting excitedly about greeting the students and hearing their adventures. One by one, each student got off the boat with big smiles and happily gathered together to take a group picture, something unexpected after ten days of living off the grid. As they departed to go home, there was a sense of camaraderie and agreement that the trip was “awesome.”

## SEE CELLS BY THE SEASHORE

It’s a sunny day in September and Beth Campbell’s oceanography class has recently returned from class at UMaine’s Darling Marine Center on Pemaquid Point, a coastal research center for marine research and education.

Using Maine as a resource for education, inside and outside the classroom, is an important theme in John Bapst’s life science classes. Having students disconnect temporarily from an ever-changing world to ground themselves in Maine’s naturally rich landscape is a great tool for teaching. It is also a way for international students to develop a deeper understanding of the state, and gain a vibrant perspective of Maine’s environmental and cultural heritage.

“It was interesting visiting the Maine coast because it looked so different from the Vietnam coast. It was a fun experience observing the different types of organisms and unique rock features. It helped me see the beauty of Maine,” said Avery Tran, a senior student from Hanoi, Vietnam.

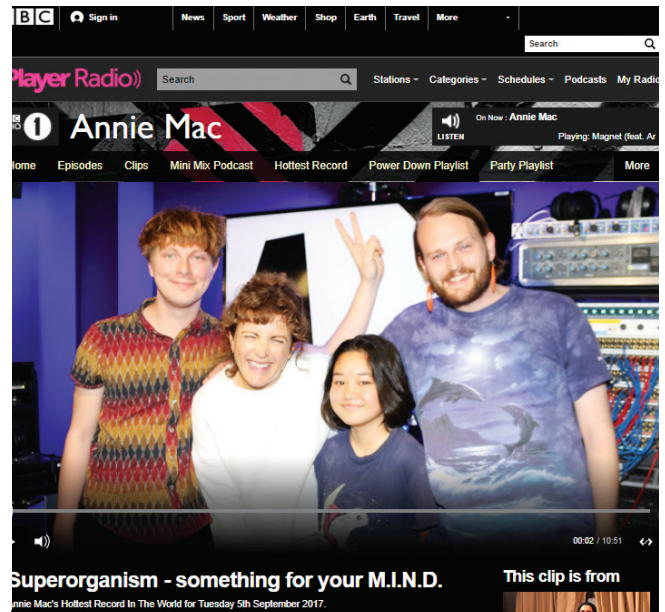
"I am confident and comfortable working in that environment because of my experiences at Bapst, which put a strong emphasis on diversity."

## Experience

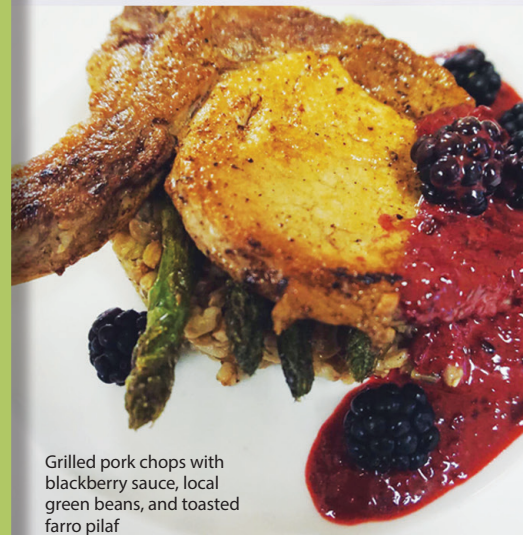

**H**eather McLeod Rushmore '95 is a John Bapst legend. She swam for Bapst, is in the John Bapst Athletic Hall of Fame, and still holds the school record for the 500-meter freestyle. She also

juggled AP classes and traveled to competitions. Developing independence and vital time-management skills were key.

Swimming was a part of her Bapst identity.

When Heather returned to Bapst to coach, she noticed a recurring characteristic in all of her Bapst swimmers: leadership. She found it in herself as well and realized that much of her own successes in swimming, coaching, and life, were thanks to a special Bapst mentor, coach Gary Isherwood, who served as the John Bapst swim coach for over 20 seasons. He was also a Bapst parent. Gary and his wife, Dede, sent three children to the school: Tyler '05, Corey '09, and Meredith '10.

Coach Isherwood's endless support, inspiration, and life advice challenged

runs, swims, and bike rides. As a mom, this meant running with double strollers and weighing herself down in the pool while her kids played beside her.

The training was a massive commitment, filled with physical and emotional trials. During this time, she experienced illness, she saw tragedy through death, and yet she pursued her dream. Her family and friends supported her throughout, allowing her to continue when it seemed impossible.

#### **Ironman, Mont Tremblant, Canada, August 20, 2017**

**D**uring the Ironman, in August of 2017, she recognized her growth as an athlete and how her experience as a coach had impacted her. As she raced alongside professional athletes she found herself finally at peace. Throughout her life she had been "harder on herself than anyone else could ever be." During the race, however, she pushed aside any self-doubt and allowed herself to finally enjoy Ironman, something she had taken years

#### **Ironman Calls**

**A**fter years of athletic pursuits, marrying William Rushmore '96, and becoming a mom, Heather felt an urge to do something more. With two children, and her fortieth birthday approaching, she wanted to do something epic, proving to herself she "wasn't getting older, she was getting stronger." In the summer of 2014, Ironman called.

Consisting of a 2.4-mile swim, a 112-mile bicycle ride, and a 26.2-mile run, all without a break, she built a rigorous three-year training plan which included long

to build toward.

When people passed her, when she got sick, and even when she had a flat tire during her race, she persevered. Things that once might have ruined her day she accepted as a part of the journey. When she crossed the finish line, wearing the gift of Gary Isherwood's hat, she was overwhelmed with emotion.

She had done it. Her goal was 15 hours and she finished at 14:52:44. She finished 1,518th overall, 354th female overall and 64th in her division (female 40-44 years old). Overall, it was a 22-hour day.

Today, when asked, "what's next?" she smiles and replies, "I would sign up again for another one and do it all again!"

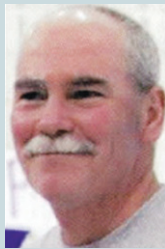

## Coach Gary Isherwood 1957 - 2017

The sudden and unexpected passing of head swim coach Gary Isherwood in March 2017 was not only felt by John Bapst, where he had coached for over 20 seasons starting in 1991, but also by the entire Maine swimming community.

Coach Isherwood was a highly respected coach, often described as fair and honest by meet officials, coaches, and athletes across the state. He was a recipient of the Class B Coach of the Year Award and had several teams earn the Class B Sportsmanship Award. Swimming was a significant part of his life, having been a competitive swimmer himself through college, and what followed was a passion for coaching.



To honor Gary and his love of the sport, the Isherwood family chose to establish the Coach Gary M. Isherwood Memorial Scholarship, which will be awarded to a multi-year member of the swimming and diving team who is pursuing further education, with priority given to students who achieve Academic All-American recognition.

As word spread of Coach Isherwood's passing, alumnus Brendan Trainor '94 was in discussions with Maine Masters Swim Club board member, Tim LaCrone, about bringing a masters swim meet (for ages 18 & older) to the Bangor area.

Brendan worked with Maine Masters Swimming and collaborated with

the area Bangor YMCA to host the first Annual Coach Gary Isherwood Memorial Masters Meet on June 24. "This meet was a tremendous spark for growth in the Maine Masters community," says LaCrone. "Gary's legacy lives on in this meet because it shows young swimmers that the pool continues after high school swimming, even after college swimming. People can continue their love for the water, which is exactly what Gary shared all those years."

Some turned out to race, some to best their personal time, some to simply enjoy the sport, but all were there to swim for Gary. As Brendan Trainor stated, "A big part of the success of the meet was due to connections with the Isherwood family. I swam for Gary, both my brothers swam for Gary, and one was teammates with Gary's son in college." Isherwood's son, Tyler '05, reflected on the meet: "My dad loved coaching but really loved seeing his swimmers after they graduated and went on with their lives and finding out what they did. I know my dad was there, and he would have loved it."

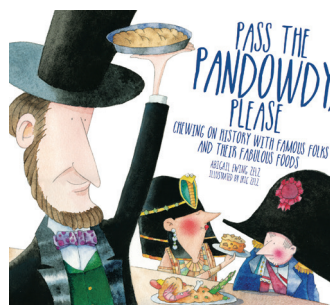

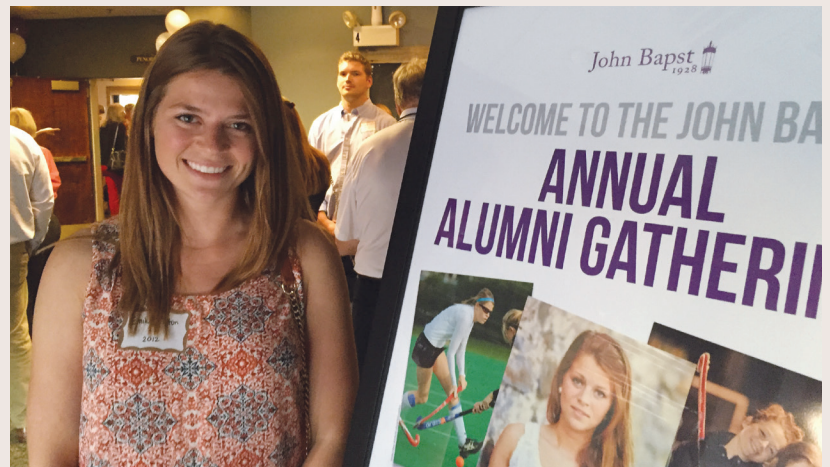

# SOME PEOPLE RUN OFF TO JOIN THE CIRCUS

LAUREN HUANG '11 STARTED ONE



When Lauren Huang '11 started her college career at Vassar, nothing could have prepared her for the whirlwind that led her to circus. After participating in theatre at John Bapst, she decided to join Vassar's performing arts group *Barefoot Monkeys*. There she learned fire spinning, partner acrobatics, and many other aspects of circus arts. She joked that it was "Cirque du Soleil on training wheels."

Throughout college Lauren worked on

balancing her love for theater with a passion for circus. She was "inspired by a revival of *Pippin*, which infused a traditional musical with circus choreography and spectacle." Lauren wanted to do something quite similar with her own adaptation of the film *Moulin Rouge*. "I thought the transition would be a simple one," Lauren recalls. "One of the images from the film which sticks out for everybody is Nicole Kidman entering for the first time on a trapeze. I was excited to be combining my love for acting and circus in a

high energy show."

Four years of work included developing a creative team with its own artistic vision, rehearsals, and establishing a crowd-funding campaign. She had to pay stipends and secure a venue. After much work, including graduation from Vassar, Lauren set a date for the show: September 10, 2016 at the Muse in Brooklyn.

Lauren was thrilled with the success of the show and the work of her colleagues. The 100-seat house was packed. "I could not have been blessed with a more professional and fabulous cast."

Since then, Lauren has seen her own production company, *Street Cirque*, grow. In October she staged another show: an original work about the British warrior queen Boudicca, who led a rebellion against the Roman Empire circa 60 AD. It too was a success.

"The year I was at Bapst, I was in both the fall play and spring musical ... I felt that continuing to perform gave me confidence. Without that, I think I'd have been much more nervous about exploring circus both in and after college."

"I've finally gotten around to really owning the fact that I'm running my own production company, and while we are still in fledgling stages, it's great to feel it growing."



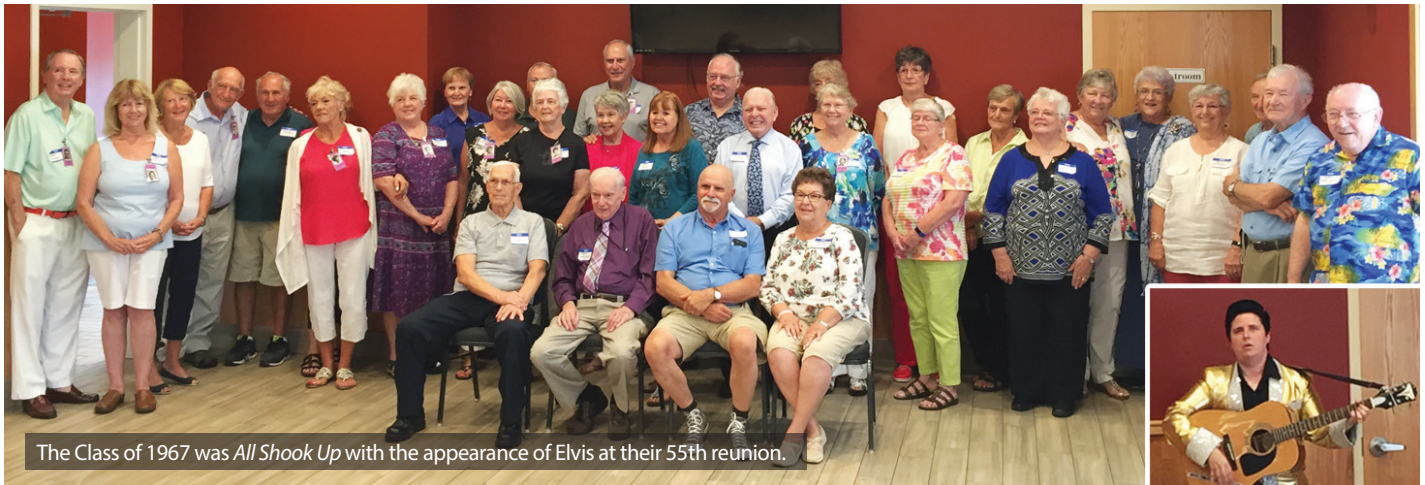
